We've now settled in our new Bible school/office premises. Though it was a hard work from getting the place to modifying it suit our purpose, we're gradually beginning to see much goodness of it after all. Every sweats and fatigues seem to be turning worthwhile. We're currently trying to purchase an extra 1/4 acre land located just next to our office to enlarge its facility. The land owner finally agreed to sell it to us at a little over \$14,000. We need your prayers and financial assistance to pull this deal through before the seller changes his mind. In the times to come, we'd like us to build several extra blocks on this ground so it may carry the vision even higher and further.

You might be also interested to know that Missionary Moses Aringo is doing pretty well in Malawi, since he shifted his ministry base to the nation's capital of Lilongwe. In May, his team planted another church in Lilongwe and the church already has many devoted, giving members. I think you can recall that Malawi Bible school bought a piece of land (about 1/3 acre) in 2006. They began a construction in August this year and just finished building their first block. God is indeed gracious with our Malawi mission. It was also last year that Malawi Bible school opened one of its daughter centers in Hewe, Zambia. This daughter school had its first graduation ceremony in September this year, producing eight sharpened soul-winners. The photos of construction progress and Zambia graduation ceremony are attached with this letter.

Pastor Nicholas Alalia and I just returned from the eastern Uganda. As some of you may already know, our churches in Uganda are called Glory Church, just like the way in Kenya our churches are mostly called Worship Center. Our churches in Tanzania are called Emmaus Church, and in Malawi, called Calvary Church, and in Sudan, Christ Mission Church. In D.R. Congo and Namibia they are yet to come up with more foundations to set up.

Upon our arrival in Mbale town, we were warmly received and taken to Sironko Town Council Glory Church by Innocent Kalibo, a youth leader of Mbale Glory Church. The gathering assembly of five Uganda churches was already in session when we arrived in Sironko town. I spoke on Christian stewardship and Pastor Nicholas on accountability. The Holy Spirit confirmed to us that these were most crucial topics which should be addressed to our Uganda churches, experiencing a conflict on that very issue. Pastor Nicholas and I gave ourselves wholly to the Lord's use for the following few days to bring healing to our Uganda churches. The weather was hotter than Kenya but not as humid as Tanzania or D.R. Congo. As we were leaving, we gave the leaders assurance of our prayers and continuous cooperation. We are expectant of what God is about to do in the land of Uganda through our Ministry in the days to come.

Uganda is the birth place of the Nile and used to be known as the pearl of Africa until the dictator Idi Amin came into power. Nevertheless, it is now on a road to recovery after decades of civil wars one of which just ended recently. Atrocity of a militant rebel group known as Lord's Resistance Army which lasted for two decades has just come to an end by its notorious cult leader Joseph Kony surrendering to the UN peacekeeping mission in November. They were practicing children abduction to recruit their soldiers. UN describes it as the worst humanitarian disaster in the world which never made the headlines. It was a similar case to that of Revolutionary United Front of Sierra Leone, if you watched Leonardo Dicaprio's award-winning film 'Blood Diamond'.

I hope some of these updates will assist you in your prayers for us. Keep praying with us, and let us know as well how you're doing. Though we know the life in North America and Europe doesn't give people much rooms to update each other very often, it will be still nice to

hear from you now and then. It'll definitely help keep each other in constant prayers. After all, we are only an e-mail away from each other.

We send you our love and greetings in this holiday season. May you experience warm touch of our gracious Savior Who came to give us hope and future is our prayer (Jeremiah 29:11).

The best is yet to come ... because our Lord is still marching on with you and me!
